The Country Council have repaired the footpath which runs alongside Bucknell Wood. Even in Wellington boots this stretch used to be difficult to navigate. New gates have been provided to prevent off-road vehicles using it but horses and walkers have easy access.

WINTER WEATHER AND THE ROADS

The recent bad weather, probably not the last we'll see this winter, brought to mind some interesting facts and figures on the salting of the roads. Approximately 1,800 km of roads (just under half in the county) receive precautionary salting when surface temperatures are I°C or below. Our road falls into this category. The average cost of one salting is £20,000. Priority is given to roads with the highest volumes of traffic and risk of accident; another 900 km are salted in prolonged adverse condition.
