### PARISH CLERK VACANCY

Gail Coombs, who has been the Clerk to the Parish Council for several years, is giving up the position next March. We are therefore looking for someone who would be willing to take on this useful role in the village. It is a paid position requiring one to three hours work each week.

The main duties of the clerk are to record and implement the decisions of the Council and to advise it on procedural matters. Meetings are held every six weeks, plus the Annual Parish meeting in May. The Council spends about £3,000 each year, the main items being street lighting, the maintenance of the village green and the clerk's salary, currently £750. The Council is also consulted on a wide range of issues. Local planning applications are the most important, but the other tiers of local government, health agencies, police, etc., all send us information. The clerk has to present these to meetings and ensure a response is given when appropriate.

The clerk will need to have access to computer facilities for email, preparation of the minutes and letter writing.

### WHAT VILLAGERS DO FOR A LIVING

Probably unknown to many of us is Mark Brereton's organic aquatic nursery near the mushroom farm on the Silverstone road. Although he grows a variety of underwater and water-loving plants, his first love is water lilies of which he grows 35 varieties – from very large to pygmy. Mark's favourite is called Aurora, a lily that changes colour throughout its flowering life.

After leaving school in North Lincolnshire, Mark worked at a fresh water fish farm where he became interested in aquatic plants. Nine years ago he set up in Abthorpe with the assistance of his dad, a qualified plumber, who undertoook much of the plumbing work to connect his extensive pond network to the water supply. He now has a flourishing business mainly supplying garden centres and nurseries, but if members of the public would like to visit the ponds he is happy to show them round by appointment and share his extensive knowledge. He is setting up a show greenhouse which will be at its best from April to September.

He uses a particular organic fertilizer which can only be bought wholesale in full pallet-loads. It goes such a long way that this lasts him at least a year, and he therefore sells small quantities at cost to visitors.

Eric Malcomson, the chairman, reported that despite one or two challenges in the shape of weird WiFi connections the company enjoyed а stable had vear. Experiments are continuing with new equipment and there was confidence that any minor difficulties would soon be overcome. And the best news of all was that the service would continue to be free to members for the coming year.

As the current directorial team are doing such a good job they were re-elected to their posts: Eric Malcomson as Chairman, David Cunningham as Finance Director, Keith Fenwick and Richard Tomalin as Directors.

Two suggestions were taken up: to organise another digitial photography exhibition in the new year; and to hold informal courses to allow people to improve on their existing skills, at whatever level, in sending emails, accessing the Internet, etc.

#### **News From the Church**

Canon Bridget Smith has recently announced her retirement in March next year. when she plans to move to Southwell near Nottingham. It seems no time at all since Bridget came to St John the Baptist, although in fact she has been here for 13 years. The Whittlewood Benefice has grown to include Abthorpe, Paulerspury, Slapton, Silverstone and Whittlebury. She will be much missed by parishioners in Abthorpe.

The church tote continues to flourish and the latest batch of winners were Mrs Webster in September (£250), Chris Scrivener who landed £245 in October and Bernie Heriot (£247.50) in November. Richard Tomalin explains below what the money is raised for and the most recent uses to which it has been put:

Without this regular income we would find it very difficult to keep the building in reasonable shape for future generations.

"In the last couple of years (after the main restoration work of 2002 - 2005) we have been able to keep on top of most of the work needed, including rebuilding the north gate steps, providing a new gutter, downpipe and bin area by the tower and having some important electrical work carried out. We have just recently had all the electric heaters in the church replaced, as they had gone well past their sell-by-date and were on the verge of becoming dangerous.

"We are now faced with a fairly big job to investigate some rotten timbers under the pews and we are hoping to be able to carry out some work on that in 2009. So thank you again for your generosity.

### WHAT AN ACHIEVEMENT!

Elizabeth and Barry Haycock have for many years opened their home on the last Thursday in October to host a coffee day to raise money for Marie Curie Cancer Care. Liz has a close association with the charity as she was a Marie Curie nurse. Earlier this vear their fund raising achievements were celebrated when they were invited to meet the Queen at Buckingham Palace and Gordon Brown at Number 10 Downing Street. But they refused to rest on their laurels and this year, with the help of their many friends and neighbours, their home was once again full of stalls selling gifts and good things to eat.

## **REMINISCENCES OF ABTHORPE LIFE**

Mrs Pat Hall has recently provided intriguing memories of her childhood here in Abthorpe between 1948 and 1958. She and her brother Michael both attended the village school when Miss Gilkes was the teacher. The 21 pupils ranging from Reception to Year 6 were all taught together in the large room. Pat chuckles when she describes some of the antics they got up to in those days. As friends of Gwen and Mertyl Webb who lived at Foscote Farm,



they sometimes rode on the wheel guards of tractors and, best of all, sat on top of bales as they were being moved back to the farm on trailers. Across the fields towards Slapton was a pool created by the River Tove called the Lasher where all the children would go swimming. The bravest children would jump off the 'waterfall' where the mill race plunged into the river. It was probably only a foot high but was a very macho thing for the boys to do.

Pat's family lived in School House. Next door was Arthur Tew's working farm and the children used to love watching Boxer the horse leading the cows into the milking parlour – now the lounge of Stone Barn. Boxer seemed such a huge horse and if they ever rode him it was like mounting an elephant.

On Feast days, when the village's patron saint John the Baptist was commemorated, the children would be given a tea party close to the churchyard wall.

Mr Davis had a farm





on the village green (now Springmeadow Farm) and she recalls when the pigs were being killed they squealed and their hair smelled as it was singed off.

The Stratford and Midland Junction railway was still operational although her brother watched the tracks being removed when the line was closed in 1951. When they went to the post office (recently reverted to its older name of the Old Bakehouse) or nearby telephone box they were forced to run the gauntlet of free

roaming geese. But the village shop, now Porter House, was Pat's favourite as this was where she used to buy

her sweets.

### MINI-BUS SERVICE

As reported in last December's issue (how time flies), a mini-bus service was proposed that would run a frequent circular route five days a week from Towcester via Abthorpe, the Slapton turn, Wappenham, Weedon Lois, Helmdon, Weston, Moreton Pinkney, Canons Ashby, Adstone, Maidford, Blakesley, Woodend, Bradden and then back to Abthorpe before returning to Towcester.

However it now appears to be threatened by budget cuts as described in the following statement from the County Council: "Unfortunately the project has been postponed until early next year as we are reviewing council budgets and as such are unable to enter into new contractual arrangements with the bus companies who can provide the services proposed. We are grateful to everyone who has given up time to attend the consultation events and who contacted us with ideas and suggestion, and anticipate contacting them again in February next year to resume this work."

#### HARVEST

John Lee, who farms here in Abthorpe, says that in all his many years cultivating in our parish he has never before seen summer weather like that experienced this year. You will have seen his field of barley between the village and the crossroads standing long after normal harvesting time and, in the area down by the Tove, often in running water more reminiscent of a Chinese paddy rather than an English arable field. Fortunately a fine spell of weather allowed the combine harvester to eventually get the crop off.

With this backdrop, the Harvest Festival service drew a packed congregation from across the Whittlewood Benefice to sing both traditional and more modern hymns. Harvest gifts were received, including fresh baked bread, before the traditional harvest lunch was served to 50 diners in the Old School.

### **PSP** Association

And on the subject of carol services, a special one has been arranged at St Lawrence Church in Towcester on 10 December at 7pm. It is in aid of the PSP Association, a Towcester-based charity (which was started in Wappenham by Brigadier and the late Sarah Koe) which supports those with the devastating terminal neuro-degenerative disease Progressive Supranuclear Palsy [PSP], similar in effect to Motor Neurone Disease. Since its foundation in 1994 the Association has helped some 3,000 families, and raised over  $\pounds$ 2m for research into PSP. The charity is small and every penny counts, so do come along and enjoy singing for a good cause.

The service will take the form of the reading of six Advent lessons with carols, supported by the very talented Sponne School Orchestra and St Lawrence Parish Choir. Among those reading lessons will be Towcester's Mayor, Councillor Charles Stanger, and two of the PSP's patrons, Lord Guthrie of Craigiebank (recently Chief of Defence Staff) and Sir Michael Carleton-Smith (former CEO of the Marie Curie charity).
