



# MINI FARM

South Northants Planning Committee considered the application from Mini Farm for permanent planning permission at its meeting on 3<sup>rd</sup> November. You may recall that the family has permission to remain on the site until 2013. As well as seeking to make that permanent, approval was sought to keep three travelling caravans on the site and to remove the condition that it could only be occupied by Mr Fletcher and his family.

Abthorpe Parish Council objected, reflecting the views of the majority of villagers, on the basis that this was a residential development outside the village confines. The timing of this application, when there was still over two years of the temporary permission to run, was questioned. A large number of other objections

were also put to the District Council, including from both Slapton and Bradden Parish Meetings.

At the meeting on 3rd the District Council planning officer recommended that the application be refused. He described the application in detail and explained the reasons for refusal, one of which being that the site is not considered suitable as a permanent Travellers' site due to the lack of facilities and local services. Both Steve Crowcrofts, chairman of Bradden Parish Meeting, and Keith Fenwick spoke to stress the main points of their objections.

After some discussion, where the members of the Planning Committee asked about the current occupation of the site, the Committee voted unanimously to reject the application. This decision has been arrived at purely on planning grounds: not only the District Council's policy on residential development in the countryside but also the guidelines and policies on the provision of sites for Travellers and Gypsies.

The District Council now has the problem of providing a number of permanent pitches for Travellers and Gypsies and current indications are that they will not have anything in place until 2014, so it is possible that an application to extend the temporary permission for Mini Farm will be made in the next 18 months.

## SUPERFAST BROADBAND

At present, broadband speeds are limited by the distance from our village to the telephone exchange. We actually do quite well in Abthorpe compared with some other villages such as Wappenham. But whether you have your own broadband service or use ABbA, there are limitations. The best speed we can get is about 2.5Mbit/second - none of us can get Superfast Broadband which is defined as 24Mbit/second or more. This is being introduced throughout the country on a commercial basis but there is no prospect of that happening in rural areas for many years to come.

However, government money is being made available to ensure that rural areas can benefit from faster speeds. At the request of the Parish Council, ABbA has been asked to investigate how some of this money can be directed our way. To introduce superfast broadband requires two things. The first is a fibre optic link to the village from either Silverstone or Towcester. Secondly the data must be distributed around the village the final connection to homes can either be over the existing telephone wires or via ABbA's wireless network. A meeting has already been held with Northamptonshire County Council and another one is planned in the new year. A formal Expression of Interest needs to be submitted by

the end of January to tap in to the money available.

To have any chance of success we have to demonstrate as a community that we want superfast broadband. Initially, this is via an online petition organised by NCC at https://www. surveymonkey.com/s/96W7GJ7. If you have a computer and use the Internet, please go there and register your interest - not just once per family but once for every computer, iPod, etc. You can also find out more about the part NCC is playing from their web site: www.northamptonshire.gov.uk/en/ councilservices/environ/bigidea/ pages/superfastnorthamptonshire. aspx

If we all take action now we could see a real improvement in our Internet access in the next year or so.

#### **ABBA News**

### PARKING IN THE VILLAGE

Among the many delights of Abthorpe is the character of the buildings established well before cars were even conceived. One of the consequences we have now to take account of is finding space for this most essential transport.

There have been recent incidences of vehicles not being able to enter the centre of the village via School Lane or Main Street, raising the obvious concern for the access of emergency vehicles.

This therefore acts as a timely reminder to people living in those roads - and their visitors - to park as thoughtfully as possible so that ambulances or fire engines can access all parts of the village.

## **DIAMOND JUBILEE MUGS**

Ten years ago we celebrated the Queen's Golden Jubilee by giving mugs to all the children in the village and selling them to everyone else. The Parish Council plans to do the same for next year's celebrations. Three designs are available - two are very similar to the Golden Jubilee ones but this time there is a new design based on a national public competition.

At one time there was a Mothers and Toddlers group in the village, but that folded about 15 years ago when there were no under-fives living here. Some money was left

over, and that was passed to the Parish Council for safe keeping. As no other use for this has been found it will be used to pay for the mugs for the ever growing band of under-16s here now. Mugs will also be available for purchase at an attractive price.

# ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL

Janet Dancer is our local Poppy Appeal collector, a job she has undertaken for a long while now. Her work for this year's appeal was as successful as ever, raising £380.55 from the village. This was added to the Wappenham and District Branch collections, which cover a number of villages in the area, giving a grand total of £3,265.93.

## Remembrance Sunday

For the past three Remembrance Sundays. the lives of former village people who fought for their country have been hightlighted. Inscribed on the war memorial are the names of villagers who died serving in both World Wars. Also recorded on a plaque beneath the memorial are the names of those who served in World War One, survived and returned to the village. That list incorporates ten members of the Snelson family including that of Joseph Phillip Snelson. His grandson David Snelson kindly attended the service to explain to the packed congregation how his grandfather had served his country.

Phillip Snelson was only a teenager when he joined the British Expeditionary Force as a member of 306 Field Siege Battery of the Royal Garrison Artillery. He was serving on the Somme battlefields near the French town of St Quentin when the enemy released clouds of toxic gas that affected Phillip. But he survived the war and returned to work in the then Abthorpe shoe factory situated close to the New Inn (see *Abtalk* July 2011). David brought along the inscribed silver cigarette case, lighter and match holder that were presented to his grandfather by his fellow workers. The inscription reads: "Presented to Gnr P. Snelson on active service 306 Siege Battery R.G.A.

B.E.F. France for his 21st Birthday Feb 21 1919 - from his fellow workers" The names of those who contributed to the gift are also stated. "Mrs Burt, M A Snelson, S Barrett, P Snelson, E Flowers, W Barrett, J R Snelson, Mrs E Sewell, W Flowers, G Morris, W Warman, Harvey Rush, T Snelson, L Snelson, D Snelson, W Snelson, H Rush, H Hunt, W Timms, W Foster, A Salmons, R Reeve, Ivy Snelson." Many of those family names survive in the village to this day.

Two years later on 23rd February 1923 Phillip married another villager, Ruby Dodds. They lived in a cottage in Main Street that they named 'St Quentin.' Sadly Phillip died from the effects of mustard gas in 1930 when his new son, David's father, was only three years old.

After the service it was learned that one member of the congregation was a serving member of the army due to fly to Afghanistan on active service that very evening. Our

best wishes go to him and his colleagues.

# Could You Be A Foster Carer?

Northamptonshire County Council has launched an appeal for foster carers for children over the age of ten. There is an urgent need for at least 20 foster carers to give local children aged between 10 and 18 supportive homes and the stability

they need to help them through a period of disruption in their lives.

Councillor Andrew Grant, cabinet member for children, learning and skills, said "These children are at a crucial stage in their lives and just like younger children they need care and support to help them negotiate through a challenging period. Fostering older children and teenagers has quite specific benefits for people who prefer not to have the physical dependencies of a baby or toddler and who'd enjoy interaction with a young person."

Foster carers receive an allowance to cover caring for a child and are paid. They receive support from the county council's fostering team as well as full training.

Eleanor Gough is currently working in South Africa preparing penguins and other birds that have been affected by pollution for release back into the wild. Penguins are an endangered species, and Eleanor and other volunteers from across the world are helping at a centre operated by the South African Foundation for the Conservation of Coastal Birds - or SANCCOB for short. It is a place where sea birds go to be cleaned if

there is an oil spill in the Cape of Good Hope area. Eleanor, who hopes to study veterinary medicine at university, is gaining hands-on experience working with animals and birds. The following is a short extract from her blog:

"Work has been going really well. I love SANCCOB so much! I managed to get some pictures of a few SANCCOB duties, like setting up pens and tube-feeding birds. Getting bitten has also become the norm. Some penguins don't need to be force fed, they can just take the fish from your hands - they're known as 'free-feeders'. It's better for penguins to be able to free-feed as it means we don't have to handle them as much. Unfortunately in Pen 2 there are an awful lot of free-feeders, so feeding time now

bears uncanny resemblance to the January sales. And there are always some penguins who think they're free-feeders, but they're really not. They take the fish from you, and then don't know what to do with it. A few seconds later they've thrown it on the floor and are back at your feet asking for another one - so occasionally you have to help them."
