# AFFORDABLE HOUSING SURVEY

As mentioned in a previous issue, the Parish Council has responded to a request from the District Council to find out whether there is a need for affordable housing in this village. The objective is to provide housing for local people who would like to continue to live in the area but cannot afford to do so. Constructed by Housing Associations, these properties are made available either by shared ownership or straight rental. Between 4 and 6 houses can be provided in any scheme. From the initial responses, the District Council believes that there is a demand in Abthorpe for affordable housing, but needs more information, hence the latest survey which is being distributed with this issue of AbTalk to each household.

The survey form has been drawn up after consultation with the Parish Council, who were keen to keep it simple. A second stage will be for individuals potentially eligible to determine precise need. We did question the need for the section titled 'Ethnicity Monitoring', but were told that this is a legal requirement to enable the District Council to prove that it is not biased. However, you are free to refuse to answer that question if you so wish.

### THE PARISH PRECEPT FOR NEXT YEAR

When you receive your Council Tax demand from the District Council, part of it is set by the Parish Council. In Abthorpe, it covers the cost of street lighting, village green mowing, the running of the Parish Council and a few other local services. This year, we have once again not changed the amount of money that we require, despite rising costs particularly for electricity and insurance.

We have, in fact, built up considerable reserves over the last few years in order to purchase the new Burial Ground. That purchase should proceed shortly, although we still need to carry out groundwater

tests before full planning permission can be obtained.

Details of our finances are given at the annual Parish Meeting, which this year takes place on 22nd May.

### VILLAGE FUND

There has been much praise for the Christmas events arranged in the village, and, in particular, the lunch for our older residents prepared in the kitchen of The New Inn (thank you Jane) by June Willsher and Jan Miles was a great hit and hopefully will spawn other events which bring together this special group of Abthopians - plans are afoot.

The Fund started with a new


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group coming together to organise the village fete. Since then it has been formally established with the opening of a bank account with the Co-operative Bank, well known for its work with community groups, who have been very helpful with free advice. There is a Treasurer (Tim Pope), a Secretary (Jan Miles) who produces the formal agendas and minutes, and the group is held together by its acting chair, June Willsher. The most recent accounts show total income to date of £1,340 with expenditure on the Christmas activities (the lunch, children's party, Christmas liahts and liauid refreshments in the church - the mince pies being offered by the Church) of £440, leaving

estimated balance of £900. A more detailed breakdown will be posted on the village noticeboard and on the website in due course. The residue is intended to be used for the benefit of the village where funding is not available from any other source. Advice is still being sought on any restrictions as to what can be funded, but the committee is busy looking at various projects. The Fund will be built up by organising community events to replace the gap left by the hard-working committee of the Church Fabric Appeal. The principal focus of these events will be social, with fund raising a happy byproduct.

To that end, plans are in place for a quiz night on 4 March. There will be a ploughman's supper

> included in the ticket price of £5, and a cash bar. Teams will be a maximum of 8, but you definitely don't need to form a team prior to the evening - come in ones and twos and make a team on the night. Flyers will be circulated shortly and tickets sold door to door in the usual way, or call

#### Speeding through the Village

Reducing the danger of crossing the road, particularly at the junction with Brackley Lane, has long been an aspiration of the Parish Council, and the difficulties are well known. Some changes have been made to the school bus journeys and stops to make interim improvements for the children and parents. Research has also been started into providing hard standing for school buses to set down on their return journey opposite School Lane where crossing the road is marginally safer than at Main Street for those living on

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the 'Green' side of the road.

We already know from the Community Speedwatch project that just standing by the road in high visibility jackets has a calming effect on drivers. The Parish Council is therefore proposing to purchase high visibility jackets which will be available to anyone to wear when crossing the road. Please contact Keith Fenwick (857083) if you would like to use one. You might also find that standing by the road with a clipboard has a noticeable effect on traffic speed!

None of these ideas is perfect, and the greatest hurdle to overcome is alerting local people to the dangers of the road through the village.

## **GIVING BLOOD**

Many of us give blood regularly, some cannot face the idea, while others know that it is a good thing to do, but never get round to doing it. However, you never know when you might need some yourself.

It is not just people who undergo operations or have accidents who need blood; there are many

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disorders which are treated by regular transfusions. Some of these are quite rare, but when people need to be treated, a constant supply of blood is needed. For instance, a pregnant woman needed several pints in week in the later stages of her pregnancy due to blood incompatibility with her husband. Some lukemia patients need regular blood 'refills' and this can go on for years. Similarly, some forms of anaemia are only treated by regular transfusions. New procedures are being developed which require even more blood - currently 2.1 million donations a year are needed.

Anyone between the ages of 17 and 59 can donate; once you have started you can continue until you are 69. Giving blood only takes less than an hour and you can do it up to three times a year. The process is quite painless; you may feel a little tired for a couple of days, but otherwise there are no after effects. There are sessions in Towcester at the Leisure Centre on 10 February, 10 March, 28 April and regularly after that, from 12:30 to 3:00 and 4:15 to 6:45. You
