Fun Day, 9 September

OTHER VILLAGE FUND NEWS

Rather old news now, but the car treasure hunt on 30 April came to an amicable conclusion after the teams lead by Eric Malcomson and Dave Cunningham tied following the initial marking, and remained so after the tie-breaker question. How else to award the winners' laurel wreath than by the toss of a coin; Dave proudly wearing his trophy demonstrated the outcome. All the families and friends who had taken part appreciated the time and effort Guy Linnell had put in to preparing the event on behalf of the Village Fund.

ABTHORPE BROADBAND AGM

The second AGM was held on 6th June. The formalities were quickly dealt with. Chairman Malcomson remarked that each year of ABbA brings with it its own trials and tribulations - whether it be wind, rain or the inevitable leaves growing on trees. This year has been interesting if only for one particular occurrence: the demise of our satellite link. The change-over to land lines inevitably caused a bit of disruption, but we were lucky in that we had already started the transition to a different service provider. The new infrastructure has now settled down and over the summer a final re-organisation to the ABbA system will be made so that we should all - not least the

volunteers who maintain the systems - look forward to better stability and somewhat faster downloads.

Dave Cunningham gave a favourable financial report. Reserves had decreased slightly during the year, but costs had now dropped with the cessation of the satellite link. The subscription remains at £5 per month for unlimited access. A significant new feature has just been provided at the pub, where users can now have free access from laptops and WiFi equipped mobiles.

With no other nominations for Directors, the existing holders were declared re-elected.

After the formal part of the meeting, the wine and cheese, admirably organised by John Riches, came out. Several PCs were set up to demonstrate voice services and other features. A CD of PC utilities was provided, including virus protection, Google Earth and a program to download World Cup fixtures.

PARISH ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting on 22nd May was chaired by Barry Haycock, the new chairman of the Parish Council. He reported that the Parish Council had the usual mass of paperwork to review. This continues to come from a wide variety of sources, some is relevant and interesting, some is not.

A second Speedwatch week was organised, this time in better weather. This is now a very popular programme,

so we will not be able to participate again in the foreseeable future. Revised school times have meant that both buses call in the village at the same time; means of staggering this have been organised. We have also asked the County Council for an alternative bus stop opposite School Lane, but they are unwilling to proceed as the ownership of the verge is uncertain - in our view this is simply an excuse to do nothing.

The road to Towcester was finally put right last summer. Serious erosion has occurred this year due to blockage in a drain pipe at Plumpudding field; we are now promised that this will be rectified in July.

Some progress has been made on the new burial ground. We have told the Diocesan authorities that we now wish to proceed with the purchase. The price has increased since it was originally agreed five years ago and we still have to undertake ground water surveys to obtain planning permission.

A survey on the need for affordable housing was carried out but limited real need was established when all criteria were considered. Our best hope now is in conjunction with one or more adjacent villages. The village confines were reviewed by SNC, but no change is proposed.

The helicopter landings at Slapton do not seem to have been so frequent lately, but the matter is still

causing a problem. The District Council, who should be taking action, continue to prevaricate - they have now decided that more measurements need to be made and that expert opinion on the planning law has to be obtained.

Abtalk is now well established as a 2 monthly feature and usually runs to 8 pages. Please keep your contributions coming.

Various reports were given. The headmistress of Silverstone School spoke at length about its achievements and successes. Progress continues to be made in enhancing the facilities at both schools. June Willsher spoke about the Village Fund. This year, a Fun Day will be held in early September which you already know about!

There are four teams within the sector, Towcester Rural covering Abthorpe and seeing an increase in staffing levels. Towcester Rural is led by Sgt Dave Lowe, with PCs Martyn Dearsley, Will Hawes, Steve Horner, Mick Wallace and Community Support Officers Tara Cooksammy and Charlotte Pearson. South Northants Sector now comes under Northamptonshire West, one of two areas (the other being Northamptonshire East) which replace the previous four-area structure. ELECTORAL REVIEW

The Electoral Review has been completed and left our Ward, Washington, unchanged. Ιt comprises Abthorpe, Moreton Pinkney, Sulgrave, Wappenham, Weston and Weedon, and returns one member to the South Northants Council The electorate is expected to rise between 2003 and 2008 from 1337 to 1399. Abthorpe's estimated population is now 295.

Roads

The County Council highways contract with Atkins for 2006/7 is valued at approximately £30 million and is being re-tendered in August 2007. The local South Northants community engineer is Nick Gore, available on 01604 654331.

In the latest plan for roadworks, the forecast is for severe delays of more than 30 minutes at busy times (is this anything more than usual?) as extra lanes are built on the A5/A43 roundabout between August and November. There will be lane closures and 40mph speed restrictions.
