CHURCH CLOCK

You may have noticed that the church clock has been more erratic than usual just lately. It has a tendency to go fast or slow over a period of weeks, for no reason that can be fathomed – not temperature nor humidity - and this is corrected usually by very slightly lengthening or shortening the pendulum. But as it was made in 1871 it probably has a right to be a little temperamental.

It is set to strike during the day but be silent at night. However, it started striking during the night but not during the day, and investigation showed there was a problem with the time clock that electronically controls the striking. Having discovered that problem the offending mechanism was removed which is why the clock is now striking all 24 hours. A new one is on order and hopefully it won't be too long before the familiar striking pattern is restored.

HARVEST CELEBRATIONS

Saturday 22 September saw 45 people sitting down to cottage or fish pie followed by fruit crumble and custard, coffee and mints, for the annual Harvest Supper. Although this is not a fundraising event a small profit was made. The Harvest Thanksgiving Service on Sunday evening received gifts of produce and tinned food which are donated to the Hope Centre in Northampton (previously known as the Soup Kitchen). They provide meals for the homeless in Northampton all year round based almost entirely on gifts from churches and schools at harvest time.

DISABILITY LIVING AND ATTENDANCE ALLOWANCES

The Disability sub-group of South Northamptonshire Council is keen to improve the level of benefit take up across the district for those who are entitled. An outline of the criteria for each follows; please do enquire if you think your circumstances may entitle you to either of these tax-free benefits.

Disability Living Allowance is for children and adults who need help with personal care or have walking difficulties because they are physically or mentally disabled.

You may be entitled to Disability Living Allowance if you have a physical or mental disability, or both; your disability is severe enough for you to need help caring for yourself, or you have walking difficulties, or both; you are under 65 when you claim, whether or not you work - it is unaffected by income or savings.

Attendance Allowance is for people aged 65 or over who need help with personal care because they are physically or mentally disabled. It is not usually affected by any savings or income you may have and how much you get depends on how much your disability affects you. There are two rates of Attendance Allowance:

- * Higher rate = £64.50 per week (if you need help or supervision throughout the day and during the night.)
- * Lower rate = £43.15 per week (if you need help or supervision frequently throughout the day only, or during the night only.)

Some examples of needs are help with washing, getting in or out of the bath or shower, dressing, eating, getting to and using the toilet, communicating your needs, or needing someone to keep an eye on your medical condition or diet. You can get Attendance Allowance even if you live alone. You will not usually need a medical examination when you claim for Attendance Allowance.

But with both allowances it's best to check out the details, either by ordering a claim pack from the Benefits Enquiry Line on 0800 88 22 00; or probably more user-friendly is to contact the Welfare Rights Service on 01604 636112 for further details, or to make an appointment at Towcester Volunteer Centre on 01327 358264.

News from the New Inn

TALES FROM THE PAST

Rob Butler and his wife Wendy recently visited Abthorpe during a trip from Australia to research his family history, particularly Welshman the Rev Pryce Jones who served as parish priest here for 38 years between 1793 and 1831. There are two relevant plaques in the church, one commemorating Pryce Jones's service to the parish – one of very few

Abthorpe priests so remembered, which may indicate he found a place in local hearts - the other in remembrance of his eldest daughter Sarah who died in 1839 at the age of 42 years. However, his ministry didn't go quite as smoothly as may have been expected; in 1816 he was in Northampton prison for debt. His petition to the court for the relief of insolvent debtors was heard in January 1817, and was probably successful as he returned to Abthorpe to continue his work for the church. Further research revealed in the genteel language of the history of the Mrs Jane Leeson Charity that the Rev Price Jones for many years before his death was utterly incapable of teaching (one of his duties) having fallen into habits of intemperance and became involved in pecuniary difficulties which obliged him to absent himself for a time from his living. An old man was employed by the parish to teach a few children in the school house and Price Jones's salary was withheld accordingly for upwards of ten years.

During the afternoons of whist we do a little reminiscing about the more recent past in the village. The winter of 1947 was unforgettable for its harshness, and memories of the postman walking out from Towcester to make his deliveries along the tops of the hedgerows because the snow was so deep show a devotion to duty

which it would be difficult to imagine today.

And a little tale of my own: during demolition work within part of our house the backs of two panels revealed they were put up by Bill Cleaver of Sulgrave in 1939. On one he had drawn a self-portrait with characteristics which projected his sense of humour across the years. Does anyone remember Bill?

The Independent Complaints Advocacy Service (ICAS) is a statutory service which supports patients and carers who wish to pursue complaints. It is free, independent and confidential and will support you to find your way through the complexities of the system, even coming to meetings with you. Atkins, who carry out road repairs on behalf of the County Council, has been testing a new emergency repair method with the aim of achieving a permanent repair first time round. So far the trial has been successful, with the number

SUPPORT AND FRIENDSHIP FOR FAMILIES

Volunteers with parenting experience are being called upon to help Home-Start Daventry & South Northants, which provides friendly assistance to families with children under the age of five who are finding life difficult.

This is a rural scheme covering villages to the south and west of the county as well as the towns of Daventry, Towcester and Brackley.

People can get involved in a variety of ways from supporting a family with a disabled child, talking to a mother with post natal depression or playing with the children. The charity is appealing for people of all ages and backgrounds who can spare two or three hours a week.
