PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

1. Rights of way

In the last edition of *Abtalk* it was explained that there had been some unexpected work done at the top of Brackley Lane on the Bridleway RA 22 (known as Withymore Lane), from arrow A up to arrow B. This led to a lot of discussion among the land owners on both sides of the lane as well as other interested parties. Eventually a consensus was reached and further work on the upgrade of the Bridleway was stopped at the start of the Footpath RA 46 (running from arrow B to arrow C). The



footpath along this section B –C has become very muddy and deeply rutted.

2. Parking

This remains a perennial and very difficult problem especially around the Church and the Green.

There have been times when it would be impossible for a car to get through let alone an emergency vehicle, the latter being a major concern.

We would ask everyone to be considerate when parking and make sure that other vehicles, especially Ambulances and Fire Engines, have clear access. Emergency vehicles must be able to get past and reach anyone in difficulty and needing urgent help.



The Council has erected a sign at the junction of Main Street and Silver Street bringing this to everyone's attention.

3. Planning

There has been no re-application for the agricultural building, further up Withymore Lane (near arrow C) that was discussed in the last edition of *Abtalk*.

There has however been a lot of activity in an old barn in the same field, on land owned by the same people. It is difficult to know what the renovations are for, which include drainage presumably of the surface water. It certainly looks from the outside that the renovations are not in keeping with an agricultural shed and may well be a breach of planning regulations and change in use of the shed. We have asked the local planners to look into this.

4. Litter Picking

OLD SCHOOL NEWS

Many of us were intriqued by the flyer that came through our doors in January and our curiosity to hear about some of the stories from times past drew a large number of villagers to the Old School on the 3rd February. Jill opened the talk by explaining than in the research she and Alison had undertaken to find out more about the history of the Old School, they had heard snippets of news - or at least speculation - about other events in the village from the former pupils of the school. Alison then led us on an illustrated virtual walk around 19th century Abthorpe, stopping en route at selected sites where there was something interesting to reveal. Whilst Alison made it clear that it was not possible



to verify the accuracy of some of these stories, it nevertheless made for very entertaining listening. What probably will stick in our memories is that there are at least 3 unexplained and sudden deaths that occurred at different times and in different locations within the village. In 1872, Isabel Brackenbury took afternoon tea with her sister-in-law in Leeson House, went up to bed perfectly fit and healthy, but was as stiff as a board in the morning! Was 'something' put in her tea, we ask? Just a few years later, in 1895, a 2 year old boy, Gerald Amos mysteriously died suddenly in the bath, while the maid who was in charge was 'having a cup of tea', whilst just 5 years later, William Coulson who lived in the terrace of cottages opposite the church, had his nightly cuppa before retiring to bed – only to be found floating in the village well the next morning. Are our suspicions grounded or groundless?

We all enjoyed the Georgian ditty penned by a rather superior 'outsider' who rather looked down on, what he regarded as, the lowly and uncouth people of Abthorpe. True, Pryce-Jones, the school master cum vicar of the time, renowned for his fondness for the drink, his debts and his decade behind bars, was not perhaps the most upstanding member of the

community, but did the whole village have to be castigated with this slur:

"Abthorpe is a village of Peculiar People, A drunken Pastor And a wooden Steeple."

The talk was then followed by an excellent casserole supper accompanied by jacket potatoes and the bar provided liquid refreshment. Thank you to Alison and Jill, and to all the organisers for a lovely evening.

CHURCH NEWS

Christmas already seems a long time ago, but, of course, it was a very busy time of the year for the Church, with a series of events ranging from singalongs in the pub and on the Green, to more traditional events in the church itself. It was heart-warming to see the support from the village for all of these – there was a record 143 people in church on Christmas Eve for the Carol and Christingle service; what a



pleasure it was to see so many people of all ages enjoying and celebrating together, and who didn't have a lump in their throat when the lights went out and the children sang 'Away in a Manger' by candlelight?

Villagers will scarcely have failed to notice that there has been work going on in the church since mid autumn. Having secured grants from a number of sources as well as using a substantial legacy from our former Church Warden, the late David Hughes, we decided to bite the bullet and finally get the builders in. The existing floor in the North aisle was taken up and levelled, new York stone laid down and the badly damaged walls replastered and painted. At the same time, the various holes in the ceiling where the plaster

had fallen away were repaired. The builders did an excellent job although they were hampered by the very wet weather which prolonged the time it took for the plaster to dry out between coats. But, in addition



to all of this, a lovely new servery has been installed with a sink and preparations made for a water supply. In time, this will enable the new social space to serve refreshments to all who use it – and wash up without having to carry water up to the church! We are hugely indebted to the Parish Council for a generous donation enabling us to replace the old chairs and tables with lovely new ones – it really does look smart and we hope anyone who wishes to use this space will consider doing so.

Of course, it has been a number of years since we removed the old

Victorian pews from the North Aisle but, having finally agreed to go ahead with the re-ordering of this part of the church, we agreed to see if there was any interest among local people for

acquiring one of them. It turned out there certainly was and all ten pews have found homes in or very close to Abthorpe. One of the pews has found a new home with Julia and Jamie Ford-Cordes. Julia has spent a considerable amount of elbow grease treating, oiling and buffing it and is very pleased with the result. In the process, Julia was delighted to come across a piece of Abthorpe graffiti – a young Johnny Foster obviously did not find that Sunday's sermon very riveting! The photos

Although modesty on his part meant that it took a little while for the news to spread, everyone in Abthorpe is thrilled to hear that Eric Malcomson made this year's New Year's Honours List. Yes – Eric has been awarded an MBE for services to the community in Tove Valley.

Eric is founder and chairman of Tove Valley Broadband, which was set up when he realised that rural internet access was woefully far behind that of urban communities. Eric then set about giving the upper Tove Valley area of South Northamptonshire Internet access far superior to anything else available.

His ongoing commitment over the past 20 years has meant that three times he has reinvented the way the Tove Valley Broadband Association has given the local area internet access – first through direct satellite connection, then village-to-village and house to house wireless, and finally to a fibre optic network.

As the entire country battled the Covid-19 pandemic, the community would have been lost without his innovation and support.

Eric continues to actively engage with residents in the village giving advice, guidance and motivation to other volunteers as they lay fibre optic cables before he splices some more connections and allows even

more individual properties access to the Tove Valley Broadband fibre optic network.

Eric will be presented with his much-deserved award at Windsor Castle on March 6th so look out for a photo in the next edition of Abtalk. Meanwhile, this photo is a reminder that Abthorpe was ahead of the game in recognising Eric's achievement, awarding him the coveted Freedom of the Village a full year before receiving his MBE!
